### 1. Mode of teaching:

The institution is adopting various forms of methodologies to impart education to students. Learning is made more student centric through combination of teaching modes like lecture, along with ICT blended, flipped classrooms, workshops and seminars.

1.1.1 Lecture mode of teaching ensures memorization, reading aloud and fresh talk, usually the lecturer stands at the front of the room and recites the relevant information related to the

- content. The main visual ad is the board, and the material is presented to encourage discussions, questions and comments. Many disciplines like Sociology, English, Political Science, Public Administration, Hindi, Sanskrit, History practice lecture mode for undergraduate students.
- 1.1.2 Blended Learning is a teaching and learning method that combines traditional classroom methods with online activities. The method integrates technology and digital media with traditional instructor-led classroom activities, giving students more flexibility to customize their learning experience. The institute follows an instructor-led classroom, where lecture is delivered with interactive panels as the visual aid, allowing for audio-visual assistance. Many disciplines like Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Geography, Economics, Education, Geology, Journalism and Mass Communication, Botany, Commerce and Mathematics practice blended mode of teaching at the undergraduate level. This mode of teaching allows for interactive and student centric learning. The various modules of ICT are utilized for the overall growth of students.
- 1.1.3 Flipped Classroom: It is an instructional strategy and a type of blended learning, that inverts the typical cycle of content acquisition and application so that students gain necessary knowledge before class and the professors guide students to actively and interactively clarify and apply that knowledge during classes. This method is practiced in the post graduate classes of English and Economics discipline. It is also practiced in disciplines like Physics and Zoology for undergraduate classes.
- 1.1.4 The above modes of teaching are used interchangeably as per the need of different groups of students. The professors switch between modes as per the syllabi and student understanding. It ensures student centric learning, emphasizing the need for overall development of the class.

### 2. Curriculum Planning and Implementation:

The institute has made the following provisions to ensure optimum curriculum planning and implementation strategies.

1.2.1 Teaching Schedule: The institute follows a rigorous teaching schedule, between 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM for all undergraduate and postgraduate courses. The schedule is attached herewith as annexure I.

- 1.2.2 Learning Outcomes are well defined and extensively discussed in the introductory lectures by the teachers of all the subjects concerned. Detailed learning outcomes are attached herewith for the disciplines under various courses offered within the subjects as annexure II.
- 1.2.3 Curriculum enrichment practices: A persistent effort is made to provide the students with application-based knowledge. The discourse is designed in a way to ensure curriculum enrichment practices such as projects, surveys, tours and industry visits. The document of various curriculum enrichment practices is attached herewith as annexure III.

### 1.2.4 Internal Assessment mechanism:

Continuous Comprehensive Assessment is followed. Assignments are evaluated in the class room. Class tests, quizzes, presentations etc. are conducted in the class room to assess how much the student is learning in the class. Mid Term Test Committee is constituted for the smooth functioning of the exams which are conducted usually in the month of December to evaluate the performance of the students.

Date sheet is circulated in the WhatsApp groups and is also displayed on the notice boards. Question papers are set up by the respective teachers based on the pattern set for final exams so that the student gets an idea about the term end examination. Mid Term exam is like giving the students a practice of how to attempt the final paper. Answer sheets are evaluated by the teachers who tell the students how they can improve upon the attempt they have made so as to score well in final examination.

As the college is affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, the institute follows the guidelines regarding assessment and evaluation as received from the university. This helps in carrying out the evaluation and assessment in a systematic manner for theory as well as practical courses.

### 1.2.5 Prompt Communication of Assessment/Results to Students

Mid-term exams are planned after the completion of maximum syllabus. Paper setting is done by the respective subject teachers. After the evaluation of the answer scripts, it is shown to the students so that everything is transparent and there is no grievance related to the marks obtained by the students. Marks obtained by the students in different subjects are shared in their respective subject groups by their teachers. Award list is also submitted to the Controller/Convenor of Midterm test committee for keeping a record of the student academic growth or decline. Due to some unforeseen circumstances or medical issue, if the student is unable to appear for the exam as per the date sheet, a re-test is scheduled for the student by the respective subject teacher with prior permission of the principal.


The complaints or grievances related to internal examination are dealt by the internal examination committee of the college. A well-organized mechanism for the redressal of


examination related grievances is followed. A student can approach the teachers, internal examination committee and the principal to redress the grievances as per the requirement.

- **a. Relevance / importance of syllabus:** a total of 93.5% students were satisfied. With the syllabus and its significance.






**b**. Balance between theory and practical: a total of 90% students were satisfied with the balance maintained between theory and practical and the remaining 10% felt the balance was average.

### 8. Balance between theory and practical




### 11. Methods of Teaching used


### 12. Infrastructure and Lab facilities for curriculum 1,175 responses

10. Opportunities to learn and Grow



### 4. Students participating in NSS/NCC/ Rangers & Rovers/ Clubs:



GC Solan build a pit for the management of solid waste in college premises by converting it into compost with the aid of vermin culture sponsored by HIMCOSTE.










Image 4: Girls common room in the college campus

Feedback on syllabus and its transaction Feedback from teachers and alumni was taken through Google form, shared with the respondents through various virtual modes. The link for the same is also available as web link. A summary of the same is given below:-

#### Alumni Feedback:

- More than 50% of the Alumni agreed that the curriculum wasappropriate to enhance employment whereas approximately 25% of the Alumni strongly agreed to the above mentioned fact.
- 57.1 % found that the course content interesting and only 10.2% strongly disagreed as they did not find the content of the curriculum interesting.
- 51% of the Alumni agreed that the curriculum helped them in developing their personality whereas only 8.2% did not agree to the fact.

- 55.1% of the Alumni found the way of teaching appropriate with respect to the curriculum and only 2% disagreed with the fact.
- According to 98.1 % of the Alumni the reading material was readily available.
- Most are happy with Computer Laboratories, College library, Seminars, Guest• lectures and Workshops conducted and Projects and Field visits.
- They feel that the institution supports higher learning and the curriculum provided• in the college caters to the entrepreneurial skills of the students.
- Most of the alumni have given a very positive and motivating feedback.

#### **Faculty Feedback**

- 78.3 % of the teachers find that the learning objectives are clear and appropriate to the program whereas 10% disagree with the said fact
- 71.1 % of the faculty members believe that the system followed for the design and development of syllabus is effective and 21.7 % disagree with the fact.
- Only 78.3% of the teachers find provision to update syllabus from time to time and 21.7% do not find any provision for the same.
- Participation of teacher in syllabus framing is only 61.7 % and 38.3% of teachers feel deprived of having a role in syllabus drafting.
- 86.7% of the faculty members find textbooks/reference books readily available and suitable as per the curriculum whereas 13.3% of the teachers do find the books readily available as well as suitable for the curriculum.
- 51.7 % of the teachers find that the extension activities related to syllabus like surveys, projects, field visits etc. are conducted whereas 21.7% believe that the same are not conducted.
- Only 40% of the faculty members find the availability of study material in the college Library whereas the rest of the teachers believe that there is a need to upgrade the books in the library with respect to the curriculum.
- Only 11.7% of the faculty members find the infrastructure and Lab facilities excellent in relation to the Curriculum. (Science Labs as well as ICT labs). 30% find the facilities to be good, 23.3 % find the facilities to be very good and 35% find the facilities to be average.






### "For The Teachers; By The Teachers"

**Solid Waste Segregation** 

Govt. College Solan tries to have very less negative impact on the environment as the college is very conscious of generating less waste and recycling it by passing it through a system that enables the used material to be reused ensuring that less natural resources are consumed. The college has segregated waste into three parts:

- 1. Solid Waste
- 2. Liquid Waste
- 3. E-Waste

#### **Solid Waste:**

The waste is generated by all sorts of routine activities carried out in the College that includes paper, plastics, glass, metals, foods, etc. The waste is segregated at each level and source. The administrative supervisor in each block ensures that the waste in each floor is collected at designated time intervals. The sweepers in each floor collect, clean, segregate and compile the waste in the dustbins (Green, Blue and Red) provided at each floor.

The College has contacted an authorized vendor who collects the waste from the designated place, segregate them, recycles them and disposes them at the landfills authorized by the government.



Vermi Compost Pit has also been constructed near staff residential area to decompose organic waste material into nutrient rich compost, known as vermicompost used as a manure for gardening.



### **Liquid Waste:**

Liquid waste generated by the College are of two types:

- 1.Sewage waste
- 2.Laboratory, Laundry and cafeteria effluent waste

### **E-Waste Management**:

Waste in the form of used papers generated by electronic equipment such as Computers, Printers, Fax and Photocopy machines are recycled and reused as far as possible. The e-waste generated from hardware which cannot be reused or recycled is being disposed off centrally through government authorized vendors.


### 3) Rain Water Harvesting

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
