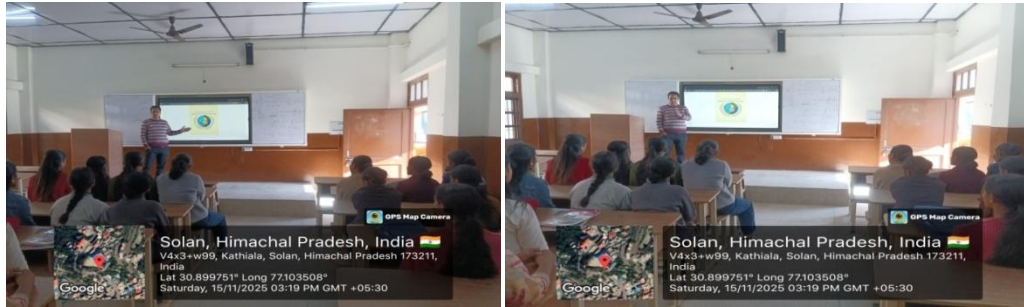


REPORT: CELEBRATION OF WORLD PHILOSOPHY DAY 2025

Introduction

On November 15, 2025, the Department of Philosophy at Government College Solan organized a special seminar to commemorate World Philosophy Day. Key Discussion Points

II. Alternative Socioeconomic Futures

Participants engaged in brainstorming how society can evolve beyond current systems:

- **Rethinking Assumptions:** Questioning the foundational beliefs of current economic models that prioritize profit over people.
- **Designing New Models:** Proposing frameworks that prioritize human welfare and social stability.
- **New Guiding Principles:** Shifting focus from GDP-centric growth to holistic development.

III. Ethical Principles for Guidance

The final segment focused on the values that should underpin a sustainable future:

- **Justice and Equity:** Differentiating between equality of outcomes and equality of opportunity.
- **Human Dignity and Rights:** Ensuring that digital and economic advancements do not compromise the inherent worth of the individual.
- **Long-Term Sustainability:** Emphasizing the ethical duty to preserve the environment and resources for future generations.

Conclusion

The event successfully fostered a vibrant intercultural and intellectual dialogue among the 35 students in attendance. Dr. Ghanshyam Singh Soni concluded the session by highlighting that philosophy is not just an academic pursuit but a practical tool for addressing the digital and economic complexities of the 21st century.
